Buzzing about a spelling bee; 1st - 4th grade

REAMS is pleased to share that they are holding a Spelling Bee in late May for 1st-4th grade students. This is a wonderful opportunity for students who enjoy spelling to develop and highlight their spelling abilities!

The Spelling Bee will feature spelling words from the Scripps 2022 National Spelling Bee list and will occur in two rounds. During the first round, students participated in a written Spelling Bee in their classrooms during the week of April 18 - 22. During the event, teachers read words from the Scripps list and students were asked to spell the word on paper. Students were not given a list of words in advance to study. Based on the results, approximately 20-25 students from across each grade level will be selected to participate in the second round of the Spelling Bee.


The second and final round of the Spelling Bee will be held in the RHS Auditorium, on Friday, May 20 for grades 1st through 4th (competing against their individual grade levels). During this round, an announcer will read a word from the Scripps spelling list and use the word in a sentence. The student will be asked to spell the word aloud. Pencils and paper will be provided for students to use. This is a great opportunity for students to begin developing their speaking skills. An invitation to attend the final round of the Spelling Bee will be sent to parents and guardians of students who will be participating.

life and work.


Picture: Students learned about sheep and how we use their wool for clothing. Students were able to touch and smell real wool practicing carding the wool.

Second grade Artist in Residence

Second grade welcomed their visual art and theater artist in residence, Julie Boada, earlier this week. Students are learning through visual arts standards, theater standards, reading standards, as well as Minnesota American Indian social studies standards. Each class learns a Native American story, then creates puppet and mask characters to bring the stories to life. Second grade students will perform three Ojibwe plays at Grandparent's Day next Friday, May 6 using the masks and puppets that they create throughout the week.

Fourth Grade focuses on poetry

Students are focusing on poetry writing in Mrs. Snyder's Creative Writing classes. Students are currently working on writing a "color poem." After picking their favorite color, students are using similes and metaphors to describe how their color makes them feel, how their color might smell or sound, and memories or thoughts that are conjured by their color. Finally, students are using their knowledge of color theory from their visual arts classes to create a piece of art that will be used to publish the final copy of their poem.
