Have a fantastic weekend and cross your fingers for sunshine and warmer temperatures!




#### Fourth graders meet the challenge


Students in Mrs. Miller's math class got to choose two culminating activities after finishing their fractions unit. The picture below with the squares may look kind of like a collage or just a 'shape picture', but it is actually much more! Students had to keep track of their squares (parts of the whole) and many students challenged themselves by cutting the squares into smaller pieces that had to be calculated into their total. The writing on the page is reflecting each colors' fractional part of the total picture.

Another option was the Heart Houses where students had to follow a set of directions telling what color to use on a fraction of the houses, drawing trees or flowers on a fraction of the yards, etc. If done correctly, all of the pictures should look the same. A third option was to play the game of Fraction Golf. Rolling dice and keeping tallies on how many "shots" it took to match a fraction for each "hole". I had to remind several students that in golf, the lowest score wins!!

There will be one more fun challenge for these kids to try before we get serious about MCA testing.....students will have to take fractions of words to spell out clues to find a special treat!
