# A NOTE FROM THE PRINCIPAL 11-4-2022



#### Dear Parents,

On Tuesday, Nov. 8, students will be adjusting to a new bus routine in the Rockford Area Schools. We have new bus loops at each school that have been under construction since the beginning of the school year. The goal in adding these new loops is efficiency and safety for our students. Therefore, the following changes will occur at REAMS beginning November 8:

**Morning Drop off** -Parent drop-off, Special Education transportation, and Northwest Suburban drop off **will remain the same** as it has been and will use the current drop off locations. Students who ride Rockford Buses will be dropped off on the east side of the school in the new bus loop, by the playground. Students will enter the school through the doors they use for recess and head to their classrooms. Breakfast will now be available on tables in each of the grade level wings upstairs and outside of the kindergarten classrooms for the convenience of the students.

Afternoon Pick Up - Parent pick up and Special Education transportation will remain the same as it has been. Please use the current locations. Northwest Suburban students will now load their buses and vans at the elementary school (where the Rockford buses currently pick up) by door 35 and the Rockford buses will pick students in the new bus loop by the playground.

**PLEASE NOTE:** High School students will load the bus **after** the elementary students. Because both schools share the same bus loop, REAMS will dismiss students at 2:55 p.m. not 3 p.m. for the remainder of the school year.

Teachers have practiced drop off and pick up procedures with students and we will have all hands on deck on Tuesday morning to help our students with this transition, especially our youngest learners. I am super proud of our students who are all ready to help each other.

We are excited to implement these changes to help transport our children safely. We will more than likely have a few kinks to work out in the first few days so please be patient as we make this transition.

Have a fantastic weekend and don't forget there is **no school for students on Monday, Nov. 7.** Also remember to turn your clocks back for an extra hour of sleep this weekend!!

## Second graders are a buzzin




